

- 2. You need to start preparing to take the college entrance exams (SAT/ACT).
- 3. You should start thinking about what life after high school looks like for you...

Graduation Requirements

- ✓4 English credits
- ✓4 Math credits
- ✓ 4 Science credits
- √ 3 Social Studies credits
- ✓3 Career/Fine Arts/Modern Language*
- ✓ Health/Personal Fitness
- ✓ 4 additional electives
- **√23 Total Units**

*Special Note: If you are planning on attending a four-year university, you must take a minimum of two credits in the same modern language.

Post-Secondary Admission Testing

PSAT - Practice SAT for Grades 9, 10, 11

- Administered each October during the school day (Oct 19th, 2023)
- All 10th Graders take the test (paid for by the State)
- 9th and 11th grade students are encouraged to sign up (MyPaymentsPlus)
- 11th graders can qualify for National Merit Scholarships

SAT and ACT - Grades 11 and 12

- It is recommended that students take both exams
- Students register through *College Board* website (collegeboard.org)
- ACT.org (for the ACT)

How do I choose a College?

- What am I looking for?
 - Size, location, costs, majors, clubs/groups, etc.
- How does the BIG 3 affect my admissions?
 - GPA, SAT/ACT, Curriculum Strength
- Have I narrowed my list down to 5-7 schools?
 - 1-2 Dream/Reach
 - 2-3 Moderate level
 - 2-3 Safety/Fall Back



What are Colleges Looking For?

- **✓** GPA
- ✓ College Entrance Exams (SAT/ACT)
- ✓ Academic Rigor AP/Dual Enrollment/Honors
- ✓ Extracurricular Activities Athletics, Clubs, Volunteer Work
- ✓ Leadership
- ✓ Teacher Recommendations (if required)
- ✓ Counselor Recommendations (if required)

Early Action vs. Early Decision

Regular Decision	Early Action	Early Decision
Students apply by a specified date and receive a decision in a clearly stated time period.	Non-Binding Students apply early without making a commitment to attend. Decisions are received early (typically December).	Binding Students make a commitment to enroll and are obligated to withdraw all other applications if they are
	(typically December).	accepted.

Campus Visits

The best way to know if a college is a good fit is to visit and tour the campus.

✓ Juniors and Seniors are permitted to take 4 days off school to visit colleges.

Permission Slips are required prior to the visit and available in the counseling office.

- ✓ It is recommended that you contact the admissions office and arrange to attend information sessions and take a guided tour.
- ✓ Many colleges are offering virtual tours. Check the college website for those options.
- ✓ Don't be afraid to ask questions!

ASVAB Testing

Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB)

Measures students' strengths and weaknesses in multiple domains and allows them to learn about post-secondary options that align with their interests, skills, and work values.

More info coming regarding a test date/time, etc.

Athletes and the NCAA

Students interested in playing College Sports must register with the NCAA Eligibility Center.

Once junior year final grades are available on transcripts:

- ✓ Register at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>
- ✓ Submit official high school transcript through Parchment
- ✓ Submit official SAT/ACT scores directly to the Eligibility Center from the testing agency

Financing College

- ✓ Determine the cost of a particular school
- ✓ Don't let the cost keep you from applying.
- ✓ Investigate all resources for funding.
- ✓ HOPE/Zell Miller Scholarship
- ✓ College Scholarships
- ✓ Local Scholarships
- ✓ National Merit Scholarship
- ✓ Government Financial Aid Loans, Grants
- ✓ FAFSA filing December- June 30

HOPE Scholarship

- ✓ Be registered for Selective Service (males only)
- ✓ Meet Georgia residency requirements
- ✓ 3.0 CORE GPA (academic courses only)
 - *English, Math, Science, Social Studies, World Language
- ✓ RIGOR Requirement FOUR rigor Courses
- ✓ Middle school courses are not calculated in the HOPE GPA
- ✓ All calculations are done by the Georgia Student Finance Commission. (not by WFHS or Forsyth County Schools)
- ✓ HOPE GPA is not rounded up, so 2.99 **does not** qualify.
- ✓ AP quality pts. (only 0.5 given for AP, nothing above a 4.0)

HOPE Scholarship

- ✓ Covers a percentage % of tuition (based on Lottery Funds)
- ✓ Award Amounts: \$\$\$ varies and depends on the type of institution you are attending (public/private)

RIGOR Requirement – FOUR rigor Courses (see next slide)

Rigor Courses for HOPE offered at WFHS

- All academic AP Courses (i.e., AP Human Geography) (NOT AP Art)
- Accel Alg 1, Accel Geom, Advanced Algebra, Statistical Reasoning, Pre-Calculus, Calculus, AMDM, AP Precalc
- Human Anatomy/Physiology, Chemistry, Physics, Forensic Science, Scientific Research I
- Any Modern Language (French, Spanish, Latin) level II or higher
- American Sign Language II
- Dual Enrollment Science, Math, English, Foreign Language, or Social Studies

Special Note: Rigor here is only referring to HOPE scholarship qualification and not to what some Universities might require.

Zell Miller Scholarship

Covers 100% of tuition (based on Lottery Funds)

Requirements:

Must meet all the requirements to be eligible for the HOPE Scholarship, plus:

- Core GPA of 3.70
- 1,200 SAT on a single test administration OR a 25 composite on the ACT

RIGOR Requirement - FOUR rigor Courses

How to Keep HOPE/Zell Miller in College

HOPE:

- ✓ Students must maintain a 3.0+ GPA in college to keep HOPE Scholarship.
- ✓ If a student falls below 3.0 they may only regain the HOPE Scholarship one time, if their GPA returns to 3.0+ or higher.

Zell Miller:

- ✓ Students must maintain a 3.3+ GPA in college to keep Zell Miller Scholarship.
- ✓ If a student falls below 3.3 they may only regain the Zell Miller Scholarship one time, if their GPA returns to 3.3+ or higher.
 - (As long as student's GPA does not fall below 3.0, this student is still eligible to receive the HOPE Scholarship)

All HOPE is Not Lost!

- Did you know that if you graduate from high school with less than a 3.0 GPA, you could still earn HOPE once you get into college?
- At 30, 60, or 90 hours, if a once ineligible student earns a 3.0+, they become HOPE eligible.

This does not apply to Zell Miller. Students must be eligible for Zell Miller upon graduating from high school, to receive the award at any point in college.

HOPE Grant

- ✓ Pays a percentage of tuition at all Georgia Technical Colleges for certificate programs
- ✓ NO High School GPA requirement
- ✓ Must maintain a 2.0 in college
- ✓ Must be full time 12 hours per semester

How to Apply

Apply for the HOPE or Zell Miller

- Complete FAFSA (Between October 1 and June 30)
 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) www.fafsa.ed.gov
- OR apply on GAFutures <u>www.gafutures.org</u>

View your HOPE average

Go to www.gafutures.org and login to your account. There is a link titled calculate my HOPE GPA. (HOPE GPA is NOT listed on your school transcript)




Dual Enrollment

 Dual Enrollment – Opportunity for GA high school students to take courses from a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive credit BOTH at the high school and at the postsecondary

institution.





Dual Enrollment 101

- Financial assistance for tuition, fees, and books is provided.
 Courses do not count against any maximum hourly caps for HOPE scholarships or grants.
- Students may participate part-time or full-time.
- Student must apply and be accepted to a participating postsecondary institution (University System of GA, Technical College of GA, or Private University).
- Extra quality point added to GPA.
- The most common schools attended by WFHS students are UNG (Cumming Campus) and Lanier Tech.
