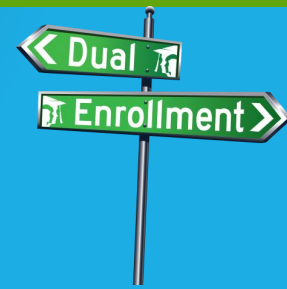

# General Information

Students can only  
take DE eligible  
courses

Offered fall, spring  
and summer terms

One full high school  
credit is earned in a  
semester of a Dual  
Enrollment class.

High School  
Counselors must  
approve all DE  
courses for funding.

# AP and Dual Enrollment Considerations



## AP Courses

- Take a test in May to receive credit
- Can take at the high school
- No need to relocate
- No age requirement
- Most universities (in/out state) will accept the credit

- Rigorous
- Rigor points for HOPE/Zell
- Get college credit
- Some universities prefer one over the other



## Dual Enrollment

- Attend courses at the institution
- Follows the college/university calendar (not FCS)
- All public university in state will accept the credit
- Not all out of state universities will accept the credit

# A Good Dual Enrollment Student is...



## Independent

One who can learn and work well on their own



## Resourceful

Have the ability to advocate for themselves and find answers



## Intelligent & Mature

Has the aptitude to succeed & be able to prioritize their time effectively to meet deadlines



## Driven

Self-motivated to succeed



## Organized

Must be able to keep up with application and deadlines



# Benefits of Dual Enrollment



Pass the class, get high school credit and college credit.



Earning college credits while still in high school is financially beneficial and may enable you to graduate HS or college early.



Successful completion of courses earn the same weight as AP and IB courses- 1 additional quality point per course.



Taking college-level classes while still in high school may build confidence and independence.

# Potential Drawbacks to Consider



Out-of-state and private colleges may not accept earned college credits.



Due to FERPA Privacy Laws, colleges cannot talk to parents about grades or attendance. Students must be responsible & motivated.



There are major consequences to failing a Dual Enrollment class and all grades are required to be posted on your transcript.



Students are managing two worlds - high school and college. *School breaks do not align; testing schedules may overlap.*



The high school has no control over college grading, professor communication, college registration parameters, or college course scheduling.

*Number of courses required for  
scheduling - Seniors must take 4+ classes  
and Juniors must take 6+ classes*

- *Dual Enrollment courses should be scheduled for early morning or late afternoon to best coordinate with the high school schedule*
- *College courses are typically scheduled for M/W/F, T/TH, or virtual*

- Request high school transcript on Parchment to be sent to college.

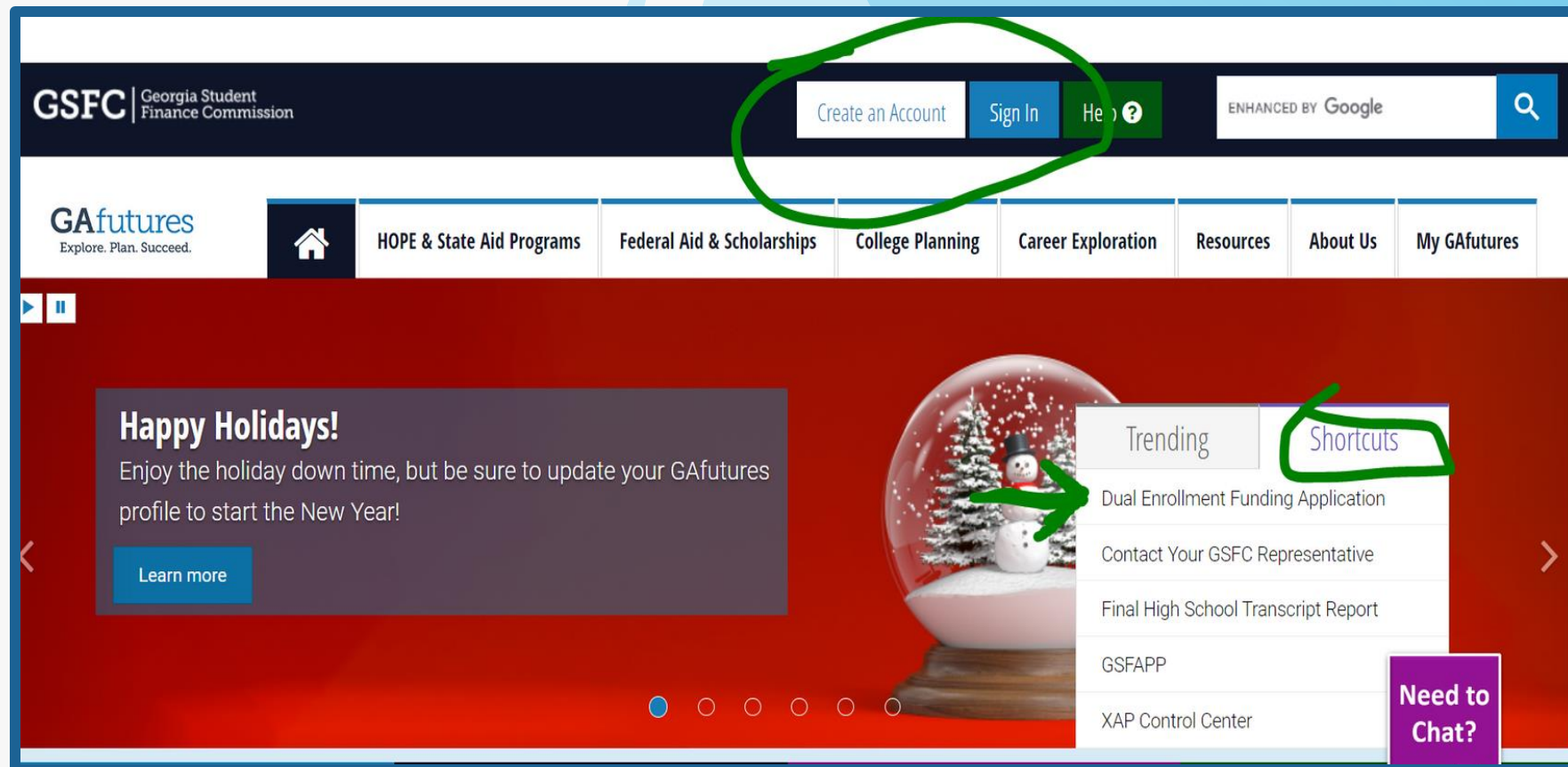



## Application Procedure for Dual Enrollment

### Postsecondary Institution (college) Admissions Application

Students must apply for admission to the postsecondary institution before completing the Dual Enrollment funding application.

### Dual Enrollment Funding Application

To apply for Georgia's Dual Enrollment funding program, after selecting "Apply Now," select the application based on the year you plan to participate:

Each academic year's application is valid Summer semester or quarter, Fall semester or quarter, Winter quarter and Spring semester or quarter.

In January, the upcoming academic year application is released for terms beginning with Summer term.
