Dear Parent of Legal Guardian:

Welcome to Forsyth County Public Schools. If you and your family are new to the United States or Georgia, you probably have questions about schools. The Newcomer's Guide will give you important information about the Forsyth County school system. A strong partnership between parents, teachers and school officials helps promote the academic success of students. Your partnership, participation and presence are needed. An understanding of the policies, procedures and expectations of the school district will help you support your child's success in the classroom, with homework and on special projects. Parent Involvement activities and programs are available through individual schools, Title I, ESOL, Migrant Education and Homeless Services.

## School Organization



Our Forsyth County School System has an elected school board that is responsible for the educational program provided by the school district. The members of the school board live in our school district. The school board makes decisions about budget, personnel, instructional programs, facilities and student activities in the district. For example, the school board decides if the district needs to build new schools. The School Board also chooses a superintendent. The superintendent is the director of the school district.

### **The schools in our district are organized in the following manner:**

**Elementary** = Kindergarten - Fifth Grade

\* **Kindergarten**- Students must be 5 years old by September 1 to be in school.

- Students usually have one teacher
- Children have recess- to play outside in the school playground
- Monday thru Friday **Schools I 7:40 a.m. – 2:20 p.m. & Schools II 8:20a.m.- 3:00p.m.**

Subjects of study

- Reading, Language Arts, and Math (everyday)
- Health, Science, Social Studies (2 to 3 times a week)
- Art, Physical Education, Media Center, Music (1-2 times a week)
- ESOL – 1 – 2 segments per day (if eligible)

**Middle School** = Sixth Grade, Seventh Grade, Eighth Grade - **6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>**

- Students usually have 6-8 classes with different teachers in multiple classrooms
- Do not have recess, they have small breaks within the school building
- Monday thru Friday 9:00 a.m. – 4:15 p.m.

Subjects of study

- Reading and Language Arts - Music
- Physical Education - Math
- Science - Computers
- Social Studies -Art
- Foreign Language ( French, Spanish, etc,)
- ESOL – 1 – 2 segments per day (if eligible)

**High school- 9<sup>th</sup> Freshman, 10<sup>th</sup> Sophomore, 11<sup>th</sup> Junior, 12<sup>th</sup> Senior**

- Students take required and elective courses for graduation requirements
- Some courses have different levels of difficulty (Math, English...)
- Monday thru Friday 8:25a.m.-3:40p.m.

Subjects of Study

- English -Social Science
- Math (Ex, Algebra, Geometry...) - Fine Arts
- Science(Ex. Biology, Physical Science) - Foreign Languages
- Physical Education -ESOL / Sheltered ESOL (if eligible)
- Computer/Technology
- Business

# PEOPLE WHO WORK IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICES AND IN THE SCHOOLS

**Administrators do not teach students. They are in charge of the schools.**

## **Three kinds of administrators**

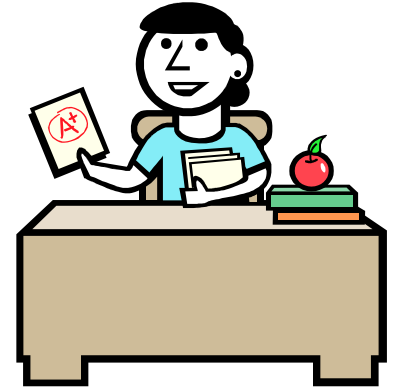
- **Superintendent:** The superintendent is the executive director of the school district
- **Principal:** Each school in the district has a principal who is the main administrator of the building
- **Assistant Principal:** All schools have assistants to help the principals

**Teachers teach the students in the school.** There are many kinds of teachers in the school.

- **Homeroom teachers-** In middle schools and high schools, students meet with their homeroom teacher for 10 to 15 minutes to hear announcements and get information about the school day.
- **Classroom teachers-** K-5<sup>th</sup> grade, students usually stay with their classroom teacher during the school day

### **Other Teachers**

- **English To Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Teacher-**The ESOL teacher teaches English to students who qualify for the program
- **Special Education Teacher-** Teaches students with special needs
- **Gifted Teacher-** The gifted teacher teaches classes with more challenging work for those students who qualify for the program
- **Music Teacher-** Teaches rhythm, singing, and how to play a musical instrument
- **Art Teacher-** Teaches painting, drawing, clay modeling, and other arts
- **P.E. Teacher-** Teaches physical education such as sports and exercises
- **Media Specialists-** Teaches about the library and helps students borrow books and materials
- **Speech Teacher-** Speech teachers assist students who have difficulty pronouncing words or speaking clearly



**Support Staff help the administrators and teachers do their work.** The following are Support Staff positions in the school:

- **School Secretary-** Answers the telephone, prepares letters, notes, greets school visitors, and helps the principal in the office
- **School Nurse-** Takes care of the sick children in the school
- **Social Worker/Counselor-** Helps students, parents and families with problems they are having in school or at home

High school counselors help students choose classes and give them information about colleges and jobs

# REGISTRATION INFORMATION

## Required documents that you will need to enroll your child in school

- **Proof or Residency** (in Forsyth County): A current utility bill/ initiation of utility service and one of the following: lease agreement, deed, closing statement, mortgage statement or property tax statement. Or Forsyth County Schools Affidavit of Residency with notarized signatures of the landlord and the parent.
- **Immunization Certificate:** Students must have a Certificate of Immunization (special state form number 3231). You can get this from your doctor or the Forsyth County Health Department.
- **Certificate of Hearing, Vision and Dental Examination:** (special state form DHR 3032 Or 3231)
- **Birth Certificate**
- **Social Security Number or Waiver Form-** Waiver is to be completed if you do not wish to have your child's Social Security number placed into the official school records. Waivers are available through the Transition Services Office.
- **Parent or Guardian:** Parent or guardian must be present to register students
- **Withdrawal Form or Transcript from Previous School:** Students in the 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade must present official transcripts from their previous school. Only those credits on an official transcript will be considered.
- **Health Information:** Please inform the school of any special health needs for your child.



## Forms that need to be completed during registration (Transition Services Office) Registration process may take approximately 2 hours.

- Home Language Survey
- Parent Permission Form
- Attendance Notice
- International Student Profile
- Emergency Card
- Discipline and Criminal Record Inquiry- (Grades 7<sup>th</sup> –12<sup>th</sup>)
- Waiver (if applicable)
- Request for Administration of Medication (If applicable)
- Records Release Request (if applicable)
- Free or Price Reduced Lunch Forms – Family applications for free and reduced priced meals are available at your child's school or at the Transition Services Office. The completed application should be returned to the Food and Nutrition Services Manager at your child's school for processing. You will be notified of your eligibility status within ten (10) days.

## ASSESSMENTS DURING REGISTRATION

Student Assessments Used to Determine Eligibility for ESOL:

- **The WIDA-ACCESS Placement Test (W-APT)** will be given to students entering the district: 1) whose first or home language is other than English; 2) have exited ESOL or the language acquisition program of another U. S. state; or 3) have student records with documentation of proficient language arts and reading comprehension skills.

**The W-APT test has 3 main purposes:**

1. To identify students who may be candidates for the English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program;
2. To determine the academic English language proficiency level of students new to a school or to the U. S. school system in order to provide appropriate levels and amounts of instructional services;
3. To accurately assign students identified as ELLs to one of the 3 tiers of the ACCESS for ELLs test given annually to determine student's level of English proficiency.



- **ACCESS for ELLs stands for Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State to State for English Language Learners.** It is the English proficiency test given annually in the spring semester to all ELL students in Georgia. The test is based on English proficiency standards to determine a student's level of English ability in the areas of Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing. Parents receive a report of test results following the assessment.
- **Math Assessment:** A short math test is given to students entering the system to provide information concerning the student's math skills to administrators and teachers.



# PROGRAMS

## SCHOOL CURRICULUM AND ESOL (English to Speaker of Other Languages)



Students must complete required coursework and tests with passing grades or scores before being eligible for promotion to the next grade or for high school graduation. For middle and high schools students, the school counselor will help you and your child plan an appropriate schedule. Counselors can also provide information on course descriptions, graduation requirements and information on resources available for your student. Support for English language acquisition is provided through the ESOL program. The amount of support provided for your child is determined by their W-APT or ACCESS for ELLs scores which indicate their level of English proficiency. Your child may have many adjustments to their new school and new teachers. Make every effort to stay in communication with your child's teachers and school administrators. Participate in parent workshops and school events that provide training for parents in understanding how to better support your child's academic success. Translation Resource Persons (TRPs) are available to assist ELL Parents at conferences and school events.

### **Title I**

Title I federal funds provide supplemental reading and math instruction to qualified students at select schools in the district. A Parent-Teacher Resource Room at the Almon C. Hill Center provides resources for Title I parents.



### **McKinney-Vento (Homeless) Services**

Tutoring, referrals, and school supplies are provided to eligible students. A Homeless Liaison provides support to students and parents.

### **Special Education**

Special Education is a service for students with medical, learning or emotional difficulties from ages of 3 through 21. These students may have problems with seeing, hearing, talking, walking, learning, or with behavior. Students must qualify for special education services(s). Additional information on Special Education services is available at your child's school.

### **Gifted Education Services**

The HORIZONS provides instruction that maximizes the abilities of gifted and talented students. For more information please contact the HORIZONS teacher at your local school or the Director of Special Programs at the Forsyth County Board of Education.

### **Early Intervention Program (EIP)**

Early Intervention Program (EIP) is a state-funded program at all elementary schools designed to serve students in grades kindergarten through five who are at risk of not reaching or maintaining academic grade level expectations in Reading and/or Math. EIP provides additional instructional resources to help those students who are performing below grade level obtain the necessary academic skills to reach grade level performance in the shortest time possible.

### **Migrant Education**

Children are eligible to receive Migrant Education Program (MEP) services if they meet the definition of Migratory Child and if their eligibility is properly recorded on the certificate of eligibility. A designated Migrant Contact in the Academic & Accountability Department will serve as the liaison with Piedmont Migrant Education Agency for the school district.

# **SCHOOL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES**

**(Please read very carefully)**

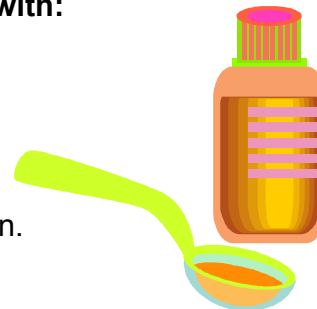
## **Medications**

- If your child is sick keep him at home (fever, vomiting, pink eye...),
- If your child must take medication at school, do not send medicines unless it is absolutely necessary. Students are not allowed to take medicines by themselves at school. If it is necessary for the child to take medication at school, parents must complete a **Request for Administration Medication Form** and turn it in to the school nurse along with the medication. Some medications require the doctor's authorization.

**Parents must bring all medications to school in the original pharmacy bottle, not in bags, envelopes or unmarked containers. The bottle must have a label with:**

- Student's name
- Date
- Name of medication
- Name of pharmacy filling the prescription

The student must go to the nurse's office to take the medication.



## **Tardiness / Attendance**

**Late to school:** Students should not be late for school. They should always be on time. If students are late for school, the teacher will mark them late or tardy. You should call the school in the morning if your child is going to be late. You will need to come into the office to check in.

**The student and the parent will be requested to appear before a three member panel at school when the school administration recommends referral or when a student has more than five unexcused late check –ins or early check-outs within a semester.**

If you are taking your child out of school during the day before school is over for a doctor or dentist visit, please write and send a note to the teacher in the morning with this information:

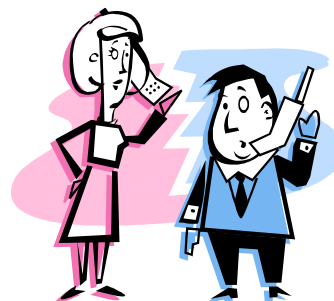
- Reason why you are taking the child out of school
- Time you will take child out of school
- Name of person picking up child if he or she is not a parent or guardian.

**Please report to the office when you go and pick up your child.**

**Absent From School:** When your child can't attend school, call the school every day early in the morning before school starts. All schools have an answering machine. You may leave a message on the school answering machine.

When you call please leave the following information

- Child's name
- Child's grade
- Reason why your child is absent
- Your name and phone number



**You must send a note explaining the reason your child was absent from school.**



## Homework and Grades

Most of the teachers assign homework. These assignments are expected to be done at home and returned to the teacher the next day. Some kindergarten and first grade teachers prefer their homework to be turned in every Friday. Encourage your child to complete the homework and do their best job he or she can. At different times throughout the school year, students receive a report card which they will bring home for you to see. **Many schools require a parent to sign the report card or the envelope and have the student return it to school.**

**Generally, grades are based on class work, homework, class participation and tests.**

Tell your child that it is important to participate in classroom activities, and complete assignments on time. Sometimes, the school will ask you to come to parent-teacher meetings to discuss your child's grades and educational progress. If you feel more comfortable, ask a friend or one of your children to go with you as a translator.

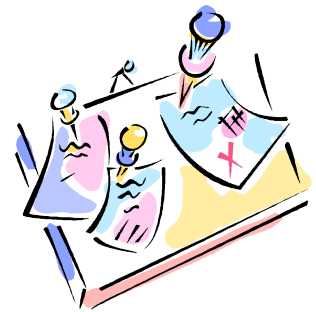
## School Clothing and Grooming

Students should be neat and clean for school. It is important to dress appropriately for the weather. Unless the weather is extremely cold or wet, most elementary schools let the children go outside to play. Be sure your child has a warm coat, gloves and a hat during cold weather. Boots are also good for rainy or snowy days. Be sure that coats, boots and gloves are marked with your child's name. All schools have rules about the types of clothes that students will not be permitted to wear. **(Please review the dress code that is included in the Code of Conduct that will be issue to you.)**



## Notes from School

If the school sends notes or letters to the parents, it is very important that you know what they say. Sometimes it may be about a meeting or to notify you that there is a holiday so the students do not go to school for a period of time. Other times, the letters need to be signed by a parent and returned to the school. You should contact your child's school if you do not understand a note or letter sent home by the school or your child's teacher. **\* Please check your child's book bag or daily folder for important notes. For kindergarten and first grade parents- Please empty your child's backpack regularly.**



## School Visits

Teachers like to meet with parents and let them know what is going on in the classroom. It is customary for schools to have an “Open House” where parents have a chance to visit the school and talk to the teacher at the beginning of the school year.

Parents are also invited to visit the school and the child’s classroom during the day. Visitors should report to the school office to sign-in and receive a nametag upon your arrival.

Most schools also have an organization for parents and teachers such as PTA (Parent-Teacher Association). The purpose for these organizations is to get the parents involved with the school and its activities.



## Bad Weather

Sometimes it is necessary to dismiss school early or cancel all classes due to bad weather. The radio or the television station will make an announcement when school is closed because of the weather.

## Disciplinary Action

The Forsyth County School establishes rules and standards concerning student conduct. These rules are distributed to students and parents at the beginning of the school year or at the same time the student is enrolled.

If a student does not obey the rules of the school, then he or she may be disciplined. If the student’s misbehavior is not serious, the teacher or principal may choose to talk to him or her. However, if the student’s action is severe, he or she may be expelled or suspended from school. Please keep in mind that if your child is suspended or expelled, you have certain legal rights. If you have any questions about these rights, contact your school. **(Please read the Code of Conduct that will be issued to you on the first day of registration.)**

## Moving

If you move during the school year, you need to let the school know your new address and phone number. If you move within the same city, your child may have to change schools so he or she can attend a school that is closer to your home.

If you move to another city or state, notify the school of your new address as soon as you know it. They can send your child’s school records to the new school.
